A Rising Tide Raises All Boats

The Ides of March brought change (to the Roman Empire) awhile back and we repeated it in 2017. Major forces are at play in the economy.

The Fed hike took overnight rates to **0.75-1.00%** on an economy that "is doing well" according to Ms. Yellen. Three more hikes are anticipated on full employment and price stabilization. The announcement spoke of:

- business appears to have firmed
- inflation is close to the 2% long term objectives
- will warrant gradual increases in rates

Normally this would drive rates across the curve higher but news drove risk assets higher and bond rates lower unexpectedly on a (1) buy on rumor, sell on fact action, (2) relative global rates, (3) talk of four hikes not three, and (4) the US's ability to meet borrowing needs without international capital flows.

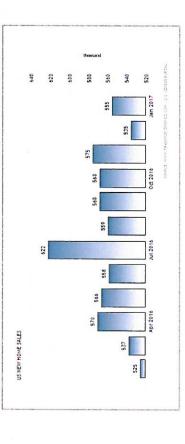
The hike was expected and needed. Growth is evident in several sectors. **Employment** continues to trend upward and claims are falling slightly giving consumers some money and confidence. Unemployment claims continue to drift lower as employers hang onto employees. This will translate to higher wages and job stability. Still, economic data doesn't show an economy that's heating up too rapidly. Retail sales in February grew at the slowest pace since August 2016 and the Atlanta Fed is still predicting a slow GDP growth in the 1Q somewhat slower than earlier anticipated. And, **consumer spending** was up in January in everything from autos to housing.

The housing market is over-heating despite the increase in prices and heavy competition for properties. Home sales hit a 10 year high this month. The foreclosure explosion is gone and entry level homes are scarce which drives up prices. Mortgage rates are still very low on a relative basis. Entry level home inventories are tight because the construction margins are lower and construction has focused on higher priced homes. Home-builders are blaming that on the lack of construction workers but margins make a better argument.

Employment Growth Inflation Manufacturing Housing

All the spending has also raised the key inflation factor. The CPI made its biggest leap in 4 years and brought the annualized rate to 2.5% well above the Fed's target.

The key as always is the net impact on the **consumer**. The **PCE** (Personal Consumption Expenditure) gauge favored by the Fed jumped to just under 2% - the largest jump since 2012. It is this measure that really indicates purchasing power to keep the run going. It is also reflected in GDP which increased to 2.1% and staying in the 2% range will likely calm FOMC fears and allow for continuing a gradual normalization.





Leaving the Global Financial Crisis Behind

A Fed hike can always also be a trap because it usually generates strength in the **US dollar**. A surge there could be troubling to exporters. The purchasing managers remain optimistic on this front as shown in the ISM numbers which hit a 3-year high. The outlook was broadly based on orders, production (i.e. jobs), and even exports. The index also saw a slight drop in prices. The index was up in 17 of its

But seen in a global perspective the rate increase on the longer end of the curve may be tempered by international money flows. Other **central banks** are behind the curve. Japan has inflation resurfacing making a 10 year at 0% unreasonable. ECB is behind with Europe inflation at 2%. Even thought global sluggishness has abated slightly the global rates will still send funds to the US markets and hold rates down.

Germany, the strongest economy in Europe has seen a plunge in its bond yields to negative 2-yr yields which stimulates U.S. bond purchases. This seems to be driven somewhat by the feeling the **euro may not last** out the decade. European investors are concerned about a possible Frexit which probably would destroy the Euro Zone. Netherlands decided to stay with the EU. The British have started to withdraw. N Korea's sabre rattling is unsettling Japan.

G-20 is a gathering of finance ministers and central bank governors. The event is expected to provide signals about current policy, deregulation and trade as many have raised questions regarding what the Trump administration's "America First" policies will mean for the world economy.



The French elections in late April (and a run-off in May) will be key to watch. Support for the spoiler Le Pen has reached a temporary plateau. May will also be another major test for Greece as debt comes due and the EU has been reluctant to assist.

Around the world, the deleveraging headwinds resulting from the 2009-2010 cycle are receding which should increase domestic demand in many markets. Import volume growth has already recovered in a synchronous fashion across the US, Europe and lapan. This slow recovery should encourage global growth and

There are so many changes domestically and internationally it is hard to say what is or will be "normal".

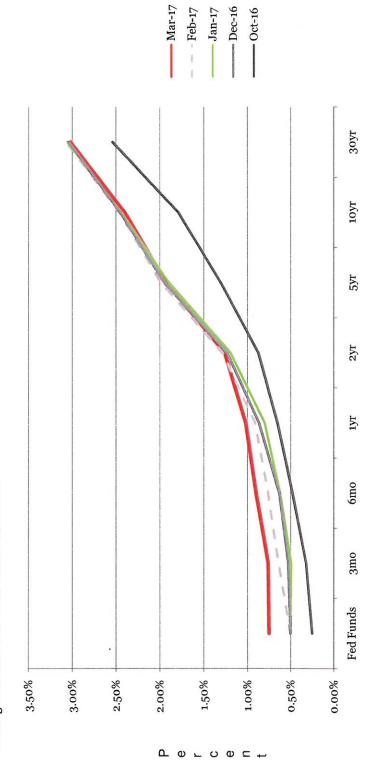


Rates on the Move

However, with the Administration's failure to move the health care bill through Congress raised widespread fears of other plans and programs and rates moved down markedly for the remainder of the month. Rates had already moved up in anticipation of a Fed move in March so they moved very little on the actual news.

Concentration on strong economic growth indicators may push rates up again but the bond market appears to be waiting for more Fed news of the number of hikes in 2017.

Fed Governors are hedging their comments about additional hikes and appear to be moving back to a two hike position for 2017 from the original talk of four hikes back in December.

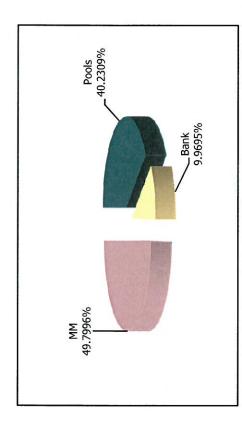

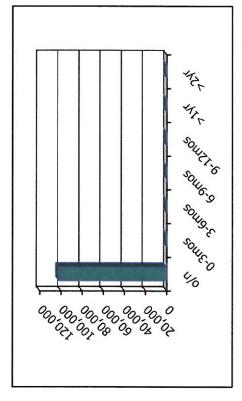
P&A constantly reviews your portfolio for optimal asset allocation and a controlled average maturity because a diversified portfolio can better adjust to volatile market conditions.

Bond Portfolio

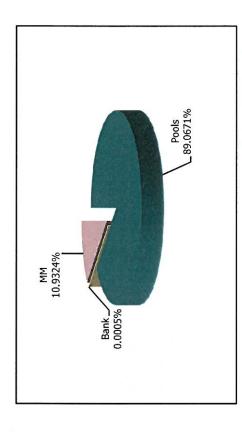

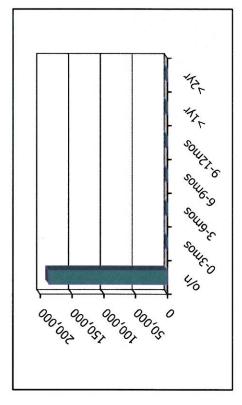

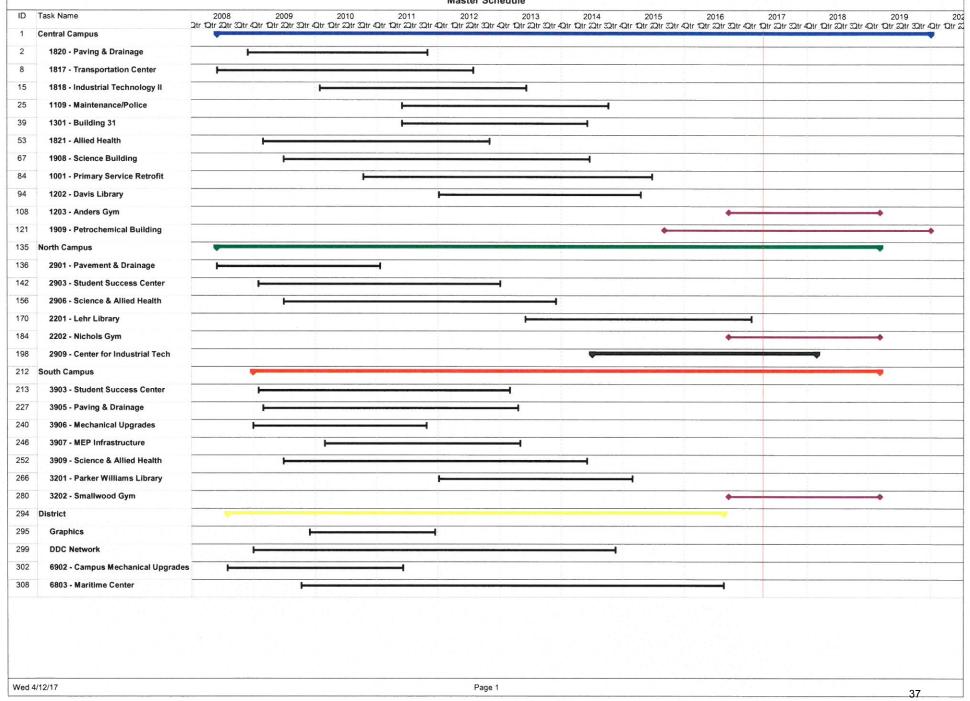

<u>U.S. Department of Health and Human Services - Health Career Pathways Partnership</u> (Reduction in Funding)

The program, Health Careers Pathways Partnership, is a joint venture between San Jacinto Community College District, the Neighborhood Centers, Inc., and Harris Health Systems. The goals are 1) to train 1,250 individuals on government assistance and other low-income recipients in basic skills in various healthcare careers and workplace readiness, 2) to provide services to support participants to reach their educational goals and find jobs, and 3) to provide healthcare professions pathways that offer nuanced educational methods to provide the skills that employers value, and credit or non-credit alternatives to meet participants' educational goals. This action is to reduce funding in the first year of the grant. The proposal stated that a partner would provide internships, assistance with recruiting, and training. The partner has not fulfilled these promises.

<u>U.S. Department of Education/Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board - Carl Perkins Career and Technical Education – Workforce Education Course Manual (WECM) Project (Reduction in Funding)</u>

The Workforce Education Course Manual (WECM) Project will continue maintenance of the web-based collection of courses approved for offering by Texas community and technical colleges. Additionally, the project will provide the training associated with WECM structure and use and will collaborate with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) to assure a viable database to all stakeholders. Funds will be used to provide three to five course review workshops organized according to Texas Career Clusters and State Programs of Study (POS); support WECM database revisions; respond to online questions and comments via "WECM Comments"; and support state curriculum projects resulting in new career and technical education courses and initiatives for high-skill, high-wage, and high-demand occupations. The reduction in funding occurred due to lower travel expenses than expected.

The administration recommends that the Board of Trustees approve the new Policy, Campus Carry. This is the first reading of the policy. The Board of Trustees will not vote on this item, but is creating awareness that the policy is being considered and input is being gathered.

BACKGROUND

On June 13, 2015, Texas Senate Bill No. 11 (S.B.11) was signed into law, which is generally referred to as the "campus carry" law, to allow the concealed carrying of handguns by license holders on the campuses of certain institutions. This law will become effective for San Jacinto College on August 1, 2017. The law requires that the College develop reasonable rules, regulations, and other provisions based on the consultation with faculty, staff, students, and stakeholders. The College has conducted surveys which sought input from faculty, staff, and students regarding the implementation of the new campus carry law. In addition, a Campus Carry Taskforce was created with 34 members, comprised of faculty, staff, and students of the College, who developed policy recommendations.

The current draft of the campus carry policy includes recommendations from the campus carry committee and the College Strategic Leadership Team (SLT). The policy draft was reviewed during the Board of Trustee's Workshop held on March 6, 2017, and was adjusted to include the general comments received during the workshop. The updated draft of the policy was circulated to the campus community on March 22, 2017, with a deadline to received comments by March 31, 2017. Eight comments were received from the College community. The majority of these comments and suggestions were related to clarifications which will greatly assist in the development of clear communications and training regarding the implementation of this policy. Some of the other comments and suggestions resulted in changes to the Campus Carry Policy. On April 6th, the Campus Carry Taskforce met to review comments and made recommended changes which included the removal of the sole occupant "private" office area as a potential exclusion zone. The updated policy recommendation was reviewed at the April 10, 2017, Board of Trustees Workshop. The revised draft policy was sent to the College community a second time for comments which were received through April 26, 2017. Ten responses were received from the College community. The Campus Carry Taskforce met on April 27, 2017 (which is subsequent to the compilation of the Board items included in this document) to review the comments and provide recommended changes, if necessary. Any changes will be incorporated in the second reading of the policy.

Although there are differing opinions on guns and the campus carry law, the College must comply with the requirements of S.B. 11 and allow for the general permission of concealed carry on our public campuses. Additional information about the campus carry law and the related requirements can be found on the College's campus carry website at www.sanjac.edu/campus-carry.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

The purpose of this policy is to comply with the requirements of S.B. 11, which is generally referred to as the "campus carry" law, to allow the concealed carrying of handguns by license holders on the campuses of certain institutions. The policy grants permission for a valid Texas License to Carry a Handgun (LTC) license holder to generally carry a handgun on campus. The policy also identifies certain campus locations and activities that a valid LTC holder may be excluded from carrying a handgun due to previously existing State of Texas Statutes or exclusion zones identified by the College.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

The expenses to purchase and install signs to identify exclusion zones will be funded using existing approved budgeted expenses in the fiscal year 2016-2017 budget.

MONITORING AND REPORTING TIMELINE

The policy has been circulated to the College community for comments and concerns according to the current policy workflow process. The policy, including potential modifications that arise from the College community review process, will be presented to the Board of Trustees with the second reading of the policy which is anticipated on June 5, 2017. Associated procedures related to the policy will be developed over the next couple of months. The prior comments received from the College community will be addressed as appropriate in the procedures. These procedures will not be formally approved by the Board of Trustees. Because of the sensitivity of this topic, the procedures will be reviewed in detail with the Board of Trustees as they are developed.

POLICY – CAMPUS CARRY

The San Jacinto Community College District will be in compliance with Senate Bill 11 to address the health, safety, and welfare of the college community. The policy was written after sufficient consideration of input from campus constituencies regarding a number of factors, including the nature of the student population, specific safety considerations, and the uniqueness of the campus environment.

This policy applies to all students, faculty, staff, and visitors of the College, except for officers of the San Jacinto College Police Department and other State law enforcement agencies in their official capacities.

NO. 1

Individuals who hold a valid Texas License to Carry a Handgun (LTC), including a valid Texas Concealed Handgun License, ("license holders") may (1) carry a handgun on campus so long as the handgun is not in plain view, on or about their person at all times, and under their control (e.g., purse, backpack, bag, etc.) or (2) secure their handgun in a locked motor vehicle. The carrying of an unconcealed handgun on campus is restricted to authorized law enforcement officers and other persons who may be designated by appropriate law enforcement agencies.

All other weapons are strictly prohibited for students, faculty, staff, and visitors; their possession on campus is grounds for immediate action by law enforcement. See Section 46.05 of the Texas Penal Code for a list of weapons.

A license holder's handgun must be concealed at all times. In compliance with Texas Penal Code §46.035(a-1), a license holder may not carry a partially or wholly visible handgun on campus premises or on any college driveway, street, sidewalk or walkway, parking lot, parking garage, or other parking area. Anyone intentionally or knowingly displaying a handgun in plain view for others to see is in violation of Texas law.

A license holder must display his or her License to Carry when directed by a law enforcement officer in accordance with section 411.205 of the Texas Government Code. Otherwise, an individual is not required to disclose whether he or she is a license holder in order to participate in any program or service offered by the College, except as required by law.

A license holder may not carry a handgun if he/she is intoxicated under Texas Penal Code 46.035(d).

NO. 2

It is the responsibility of license holders to carry their handguns on or about their person at all times. "About" the person means that a license holder may carry a holstered handgun in a backpack or handbag, but the backpack or handbag must be close enough that the license holder can grasp it without materially changing position. A license holder who carries a handgun on campus must carry it in a holster that completely covers the trigger and the entire trigger guard area. The holster must have sufficient tension or grip on the handgun to retain it in the holster even when subjected to unexpected jostling.

The College does not provide storage for handguns.

The open carry of handguns is not permitted on college premises.

NO. 3

The College is often the site of Pre-K-12 school-sponsored activities, such as field trips. When a Pre-K-12 school-sponsored activity is conducted at a particular location, the carrying of concealed handguns is prohibited. A sign shall be posted reading "Pre-K-12 school-sponsored activity in progress" during these activities. "School-sponsored activities" for purposes of this policy are defined as: tours, demonstrations, field trips, events, clubs, camps, clinics, programs, etc., held on College property that are authorized by a K-12 school district or individual school(s) as a curricular, co-curricular, or interscholastic activity and are managed or supervised in part by the district or school, or district or school employee.

Upon a survey of the College campuses, areas identified as routinely hosting such schoolsponsored activities shall be posted on the College's rules and regulations regarding campus carry.

NO. 4

Texas Penal Code §46.03(a)(2) excludes license holders of handguns from carrying a handgun on premises of a polling place on the day of an election or while early voting is in progress according to Policy 2-19. A sign shall be posted at any polling place located on campus from the commencement of early voting through Election Day that reads either "Polling Place" or "Vote Here." (See Electioneering Procedure _____)

NO. 5

Texas Penal Code §46.035(b)(6) excludes license holders of handguns from carrying a handgun on the premises of a church, synagogue, or other established place of religious worship. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Section 30.06 of the Texas Penal Code.

NO. 6

Texas Penal Code §46.035(b)(2) excludes license holders of handguns from carrying a handgun where a high school, collegiate, or professional sporting event or interscholastic event is taking place, unless the license holder is a participant in the event and a handgun is used in the event. Notice shall be given for all collegiate sporting events. If possible, for ticketed sporting events this notice should be given by means of a written communication on the back of, or appended to, the ticket. Vendors and others who are permitted to enter the premises without a ticket shall be provided written notice through other means. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

NO. 7

The concealed carry of handguns shall be prohibited in areas for which state or federal law, licensing requirements, or contracts require exclusion at the exclusive discretion of the state or federal government, or are required by a campus accrediting authority. Where appropriate, signage must conform to the overriding federal or state law requirements. Otherwise, notice conforming to Texas Penal Code §30.06 must be provided.

NO.8

The concealed carry of handguns shall be prohibited in patient-care areas, including those in which professional mental health and counseling services are provided. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

NO. 9

The concealed carry of handguns shall be prohibited in areas in which formal hearings are being conducted pursuant to Code of Student Conduct (Student Handbook); Academic Hearings; Veterans Appeal Hearings; Financial Aid Appeal Hearings; Employee Hearings; and Employee Grievances. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

NO. 10

The concealed carry of handguns shall be prohibited in areas where the discharge of a firearm might cause great harm, such as laboratories with extremely dangerous chemicals, biologic agents, explosive agents, critical infrastructure, and areas with equipment that is incompatible with metallic objects, such as magnetic resonance imaging machines. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

NO. 11

Counselors, staff, and volunteers who work in a campus program for minors must, as a condition of their participation, agree not to carry a concealed handgun on the grounds or in buildings where the program is conducted. Parents of attendees must also agree, as a condition of their child's participation, not to carry a concealed handgun on the grounds or in buildings where the program is conducted. "Campus program for minors" is defined as to provide oversight and training for camps and programs involving minors held on College premises or operated by the College which have recreational, athletic, religious, or educational activities for the campers. This includes all camps or programs covered by Texas Education Code, Chapter 51, Section 51.976, as well as any day camp, activity, or University Interscholastic League ("UIL") event sponsored by the College. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

This policy does not apply to College course-based academic service learning or research approved by the Institutional Review Board ("IRB").

NO. 12

The College shall amend the Code of Student Conduct, Faculty Handbook, and San Jacinto Policy and Procedure Manual to provide that causing the accidental or intentional showing of a firearm or the accidental discharge of a firearm is conduct subject to disciplinary action.

NO. 13

Exclusion zones created by Texas Penal Code §§46.03 and 46.035 as well as by the rules and regulations enacted under S.B. 11 may sometimes comprise only a portion of a building. In some instances it may not be feasible to exclude concealed handguns only from the designated exclusion zones. The following factors and principles shall govern the implementation of these rules and regulations in those buildings in which some, but not all parts are designated as exclusion zones.

Governing factors:

- The percentage of assignable space or rooms in a building that are designated as exclusion zones.
- The extent to which the area (or areas) designated as exclusion zones are segregated from other areas of the building.
- The extent to which use of the building, and hence its status as an exclusion zone, varies from day-to- day or week-to-week.

Governing principles:

- If a small number of rooms or a small fraction of assignable space in a building is subject to exclusion, only the rooms or areas that qualify for exclusion should be excluded.
- If 85% or more of the total building in terms of number of rooms or assignable space is subject to exclusion, or if the excludable space is not segregated from other space, then as a matter of practicality, the whole building may be excluded.
- Appropriate signage shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

NO. 14

The College shall develop training materials particular to San Jacinto College on how to respond to an active shooter situation. These shall be incorporated in the active shooter training, and all faculty and staff shall be required to complete this module. All students are encouraged to complete training on how to respond to an active shooter situation.

NO. 15

The College shall develop and post in a prominent place a detailed Campus Carry FAQ.

NO. 16

The College shall develop materials that educate and inform current and prospective San Jacinto College students about campus carry and how it is being implemented.

NO. 17

To the extent possible, areas within gun-exclusion zones should be made available on a scheduled basis to faculty and staff. These spaces can be used for conferences that faculty or staff would prefer to conduct in a gun-exclusion zone.

NO. 18

The following factors and principles shall govern the implementation of exclusions or allowances for Graduation ceremonies.

Governing factors:

- Off-campus location shall follow the venue's rules and regulations in regards to the permitted carrying of firearms.
- On-campus location shall follow the use of the building and/or exclusion zone criteria set forth herein.

NO. 19

The Campus Safety and Security Council, appointed by the Chancellor, shall be established and tasked, at a minimum, with the following responsibilities:

- (1) Support the consistent implementation of these policies;
- (2) Provide a review process for recommendations to the Chancellor; and
- (3) Compile, maintain, and provide a periodic review of the premises where license holders are prohibited from carrying a handgun.

A student, or a member of the faculty or staff of the College may appeal a decision regarding the implementation of a policy or procedure contained herein to the Campus Safety and Security Council for consideration. A further appeal of the decision of the Campus Safety and Security Council may be submitted to the Vice Chancellor of Fiscal Affairs for consideration. The Vice Chancellor of Fiscal Affairs may choose to make a final decision or submit the appeal to the Chancellor for consideration. The Chancellor may approve, reject, or modify the decision in question, or may submit the issue to the Campus Safety and Security Council for reconsideration. The decision of the Chancellor to approve, reject, or modify a decision is final.

Additional policies or exclusion areas not provided for in this policy will not be the subject of or considered as a matter of appeal. In accordance with Texas Government Code, Section <u>411.2031</u>, the Chancellor is authorized to enact reasonable rules and regulations regarding the concealed carry of handguns on campus.

NO. 20

Not later than September 1 of each even-numbered year, the College shall submit a report to the Texas Legislature and to the standing committees of the Legislature with jurisdiction over the implementation of these policies that:

- (1) Describes the rules and regulations adopted by the College regarding the carrying of concealed handguns on its campuses; and
- (2) Outlines the reasons the College established the provisions adopted.

POLICY – CAMPUS CARRY

The San Jacinto Community College District will be in compliance with Senate Bill 11 to address the health, safety, and welfare of the college community. The policy was written after sufficient consideration of input from campus constituencies regarding a number of factors, including the nature of the student population, specific safety considerations, and the uniqueness of the campus environment.

This policy applies to all students, faculty, staff, and visitors of the College, except for officers of the San Jacinto College Police Department and other State law enforcement agencies in their official capacities.

NO. 1

Individuals who hold a valid Texas License to Carry a Handgun (LTC), including a valid Texas Concealed Handgun License, ("license holders") may (1) carry a handgun on campus so long as the handgun is not in plain view, on or about their person at all times, and under their control (e.g., purse, backpack, bag, etc.) or (2) secure their handgun in a locked motor vehicle. The carrying of an unconcealed handgun on campus is restricted to authorized law enforcement officers and other persons who may be designated by appropriate law enforcement agencies.

All other weapons are strictly prohibited for students, faculty, staff, and visitors; their possession on campus is grounds for immediate action by law enforcement. See Section 46.05 of the Texas Penal Code for a list of weapons.

A license holder's handgun must be concealed at all times. In compliance with Texas Penal Code §46.035(a-1), a license holder may not carry a partially or wholly visible handgun on campus premises or on any college driveway, street, sidewalk or walkway, parking lot, parking garage, or other parking area. Anyone intentionally or knowingly displaying a handgun in plain view for others to see is in violation of Texas law.

A license holder must display his or her License to Carry when directed by a law enforcement officer in accordance with section 411.205 of the Texas Government Code. Otherwise, an individual is not required to disclose whether he or she is a license holder in order to participate in any program or service offered by the College, except as required by law.

A license holder may not carry a handgun if he/she is intoxicated <u>under (Texas Penal Code Ref _____).46.035(d).</u>

NO. 2

It is the responsibility of license holders to carry their handguns on or about their person at all times. "About" the person means that a license holder may carry a holstered handgun in a backpack or handbag, but the backpack or handbag must be close enough that the license holder can grasp it without materially changing position. A license holder who carries a handgun on campus must carry it in a holster that completely covers the trigger and the entire trigger guard area. The holster must have sufficient tension or grip on the handgun to retain it in the holster even when subjected to unexpected jostling.

The College does not provide storage for handguns.

The open carry of handguns is not permitted on college premises.

NO. 3

The College is often the site of Pre-K-12 school-sponsored activities, such as field trips. When a Pre-K-12 school-sponsored activity is conducted at a particular location, the carrying of concealed handguns is prohibited. A sign shall be posted reading "Pre-K-12 school-sponsored activity in progress" will be posted during these activities. "School-sponsored activities" for purposes of this policy are defined as: tours, demonstrations, field trips, events, clubs, camps, clinics, programs, etc., held on College property that are authorized by a K-12 school district or individual school(s) as a curricular, co-curricular, or interscholastic activity and are managed or supervised in part by the district or school, or district or school employee.

Upon a survey of the College campuses, areas identified as routinely hosting such schoolsponsored activities shall be posted on the College's rules and regulations regarding campus carry.

NO. 4

Texas Penal Code §46.03(a)(2) excludes license holders of handguns from carrying a handgun on premises of a polling place on the day of an election or while early voting is in progress according to Policy 2-19. A sign shall be posted at any polling place located on campus from the commencement of early voting through Election Day that reads either "Polling Place" or "Vote Here." (See Electioneering Procedure _____)

NO. 5

Texas Penal Code §46.035(b)(6) excludes license holders of handguns from carrying a handgun on the premises of a church, synagogue, or other established place of religious worship. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Section 30.06 of the Texas Penal Code.

NO. 6

Texas Penal Code §46.035(b)(2) excludes license holders of handguns from carrying a handgun where a high school, collegiate, or professional sporting event or interscholastic event is taking place, unless the license holder is a participant in the event and a handgun is used in the event. Notice shall be given for all collegiate sporting events. If possible, for ticketed sporting events this notice should be given by means of a written communication on the back of, or appended to, the ticket. Vendors and others who are permitted to enter the premises without a ticket shall be provided written notice through other means. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

NO. 7

The concealed carry of handguns shall be prohibited in areas for which state or federal law, licensing requirements, or contracts require exclusion at the exclusive discretion of the state or federal government, or are required by a campus accrediting authority. Where appropriate, signage must conform to the overriding federal or state law requirements. Otherwise, notice conforming to Texas Penal Code §30.06 must be provided.

NO.8

The concealed carry of handguns shall be prohibited in patient-care areas, including those in which professional mental health and counseling services are provided. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

NO.9

The concealed carry of handguns shall be prohibited in areas in which formal hearings are being conducted pursuant to Code of Student Conduct (Student Handbook); Academic Hearings; Veterans Appeal Hearings; Financial Aid Appeal Hearings; Employee Hearings; and Employee Grievances. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

NO. 10

The concealed carry of handguns shall be prohibited in areas where the discharge of a firearm might cause great harm, such as laboratories with extremely dangerous chemicals, biologic agents, explosive agents, critical infrastructure, and areas with equipment that is incompatible with metallic objects, such as magnetic resonance imaging machines. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

NO. 11

Counselors, staff, and volunteers who work in a campus program for minors must, as a condition of their participation, agree not to carry a concealed handgun on the grounds or in buildings where the program is conducted. Parents of attendees must also agree, as a condition of their child's participation, not to carry a concealed handgun on the grounds or in buildings where the program is conducted. "Campus program for minors" is defined as to provide oversight and training for camps and programs involving minors held on College premises or operated by the College which have recreational, athletic, religious, or educational activities for the campers. This includes all camps or programs covered by Texas Education Code, Chapter 51, Section 51.976, as well as any day camp, activity, or University Interscholastic League ("UIL") event sponsored by the College. A sign shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

This policy does not apply to College course-based academic service learning or research approved by the Institutional Review Board ("IRB").

NO. 12

The occupant of an office to which the occupant has been solely assigned and that is not generally open to the public may apply to prohibit the concealed carry of a handgun in that office. Upon approval, a sign shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06. In addition, if the occupant's duties ordinarily entail meeting people who may be license holders, the occupant must make reasonable arrangements to meet them in another location at a reasonable time.

NO. 1312

The College shall amend the Code of Student Conduct, Faculty Handbook, and San Jacinto Policy and Procedure Manual to provide that causing the accidental or intentional showing of a firearm or the accidental discharge of a firearm is conduct subject to disciplinary action.

NO. 1413

Exclusion zones created by Texas Penal Code §§46.03 and 46.035 as well as by the rules and regulations enacted under S.B. 11 may sometimes comprise only a portion of a building. In some instances it may not be feasible to exclude concealed handguns only from the designated exclusion zones. The following factors and principles shall govern the implementation of these rules and regulations in those buildings in which some, but not all parts are designated as exclusion zones.

Governing factors:

- The percentage of assignable space or rooms in a building that are designated as exclusion zones.
- The extent to which the area (or areas) designated as exclusion zones are segregated from other areas of the building.
- The extent to which use of the building, and hence its status as an exclusion zone, varies from day-to- day or week-to-week.

Governing principles:

- If a small number of rooms or a small fraction of assignable space in a building is subject to exclusion, only the rooms or areas that qualify for exclusion should be excluded.
- If 9085% or more of the total building in terms of number of rooms or assignable space is subject to exclusion, or if the excludable space is not segregated from other space, then as a matter of practicality, the whole building should-may be excluded.
- Appropriate signage shall be posted that conforms to Texas Penal Code, Section 30.06.

NO. 1514

The College shall develop training materials particular to San Jacinto College on how to respond to an active shooter situation. These shall be incorporated in the active shooter training, and all faculty and staff shall be required to complete this module. All students are encouraged to complete training on how to respond to an active shooter situation.

NO. 1615

The College shall develop and post in a prominent place a detailed Campus Carry FAQ.

NO. 1716

The College shall develop materials that educate and inform current and prospective San Jacinto College students about campus carry and how it is being implemented.

NO. 18 <u>17</u>

To the extent possible, areas within gun-exclusion zones should be made available on a scheduled basis to faculty and staff who do not have offices to which they are solely assigned. These spaces can be used for conferences that faculty or staff would prefer to conduct in a gun-exclusion zone.

NO. 1918

The following factors and principles shall govern the implementation of exclusions or allowances for Graduation ceremonies.

Governing factors:

- Off-campus location shall follow the venue's rules and regulations in regards to the permitted carrying of firearms.
- On-campus location shall follow the use of the building and/or exclusion zone criteria set forth herein.

NO. 2019

The Campus Safety and Security Council, appointed by the Chancellor, shall be established and tasked, at a minimum, with the following responsibilities:

- (1) Support the consistent implementation of these policies;
- (2) Provide a review process for recommendations to the Chancellor; and
- (3) Compile, maintain, and provide a periodic review of the premises where license holders are prohibited from carrying a handgun.

A student, or a member of the faculty or staff of the College may appeal a decision regarding the implementation of a policy or procedure contained herein to the Campus Safety and Security Council for consideration. The decision of the Chancellor to approve, reject, or modify a decision is final.

Additional policies or exclusion areas not provided for in this policy will not be the subject of or considered as a matter of appeal. In accordance with Texas Government Code, Section 411.2031, the Chancellor is authorized to enact reasonable rules and regulations regarding the concealed carry of handguns on campus.

NO. 2120

The administration recommends the Board of Trustees approve a contract with Structure Tone Southwest, LLC (Structure Tone) for the South Campus Bruce Student Center Renovation Project – Phase I.

BACKGROUND

The South Campus Student Center has been designated for renovation with the 2015 Bond Program. The proposed renovation will be carried out incrementally in phases, with the east half of the second floor and the west section of the first floor renovated in the first phase.

The groups identified to occupy the space renovated by Phase I are the Learning and Assessment, Student Services, and Registrar and Enrollment Management departments. The scope of work will provide for the renovation and installation of College standard furniture and office systems within approximately 14,400 square feet of the building's total 57,325 square feet.

A request for competitive sealed proposals, Project Number 17-16, was issued to procure renovation services for this project. Four responses were received and evaluated by a team comprised of representatives from Facility Services, the campus, the department, and AECOM personnel. The evaluation team determined the proposal submitted by Structure Tone would provide the best value to the College and could complete the project within the desired schedule completion date.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

This action will result in improvement of South Campus Student Center workspaces and support areas for thirty-one (31) people within the Learning & Assessment, Student Services, and Registrar and Enrollment Management departments.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

The estimated construction expenditure will not exceed \$1,218,481 pending final contract negotiations. This expenditure is funded from the 2015 Bond Program and includes a ten percent contingency factor.

MONITORING AND REPORTING TIMELINE

All work is scheduled to be completed in sixty (60) calendar days from issuance of Notice to Proceed. Facilities Services personnel will oversee the project. Program management will be provided by AECOM.

BACKGROUND

A request for proposal, Project Number 15-11, was issued in April 2015 to procure electrical services for the Maintenance department. The Board approved the original contract with Alpha Electric Company in June 2015. The Maintenance department is responsible for maintaining the College's electrical and lighting systems. Services from an outside electrical maintenance firm is required for larger projects and on an as needed basis to assist with emergency repairs that arise throughout the year.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

Alpha Electric Company provides electrical services when the College does not have the capability to perform these services with our own staff due to the complexity of the project or the time constraints required to complete the work. The qualified licensed electrical contractor will supply staff and equipment on a project specific basis.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

The estimated annual expenditure for this request is \$200,000. This expenditure will be funded from the Maintenance department's 2016-2017 operating budget and subsequent year budgets.

The administration recommends the Board of Trustees approve an event license contract with the Houston Astros as the venue for the December 2017 graduation ceremony.

BACKGROUND

This is a licensing agreement with the Houston Astros to host the College's fall commencement ceremony at Minute Maid Park on Sunday, December 10, 2017 at 2:00 PM. This is the fourth San Jacinto College commencement event held at Minute Maid Park and will serve graduating students from summer and fall 2017 semesters. The venue will accommodate guest seating of 10,000. The attendance at previous commencement events was estimated at 8,700 guests, 819 graduation participants, and 300 faculty.

Leasing of an event venue is precluded from the competitive bidding requirements mandated by Chapter 44 of the Texas Education Code.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

The fall 2017 commencement ceremony will host an estimated 950 student participants and their guests. If this agreement is not approved it will be necessary to locate another venue that will accommodate graduates, faculty and guests for the fall ceremony.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

The estimated expenditure for this request is \$100,000. This expenditure will be funded from the Student Services department's 2016-2017 and 2017-2018 operating budgets.

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The administration recommends the Board of Trustees approve a renewal of the contract for consumable welding products with Lincoln Electric for the North and Central Campus Welding departments.

BACKGROUND

An invitation for bids, Project Number 15-10, was issued in April 2015 to procure consumable welding products for Central and North Welding Technology courses. The Board approved the original contract with Lincoln Electric in June 2015.

Welding Technology courses have been offered at Central Campus since 1972 and at North Campus since 1976. The programs offer an Associate Degree in Applied Science in Welding Technology; two (2) Certificates of Technology: Combination Welder and Gas Shielded Welding; and two (2) Occupational Certificates: Art-Welding and Stick Pipe Welder.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

Consumable welding products such as welding rods, wires, and tools are needed on a daily basis to teach welding students. Procuring these products directly from the manufacturer utilizing their special educational rate. These savings offset other recurring program expenses such as replacement of aging equipment.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

The estimated annual expenditure is \$55,000 and will be funded from the North and Central Welding departments' 2016 - 2017 operating budgets and subsequent year budgets, subject to approval by the Board.

MONITORING AND REPORTING TIMELINE

This renewal will exercise the second of three one-year contract renewal options available. The new contract term will be June 2, 2017 through June 1, 2018.

The administration recommends that the Board of Trustees authorize the Vice Chancellor of Fiscal Affairs to approve the Certificate of Substantial Completion for the North Campus Center for Industrial Technology (CIT).

BACKGROUND

Durotech was awarded the Construction Manager-at-Risk contract, Project 14-16, in October 2014 to construct the new North Campus CIT. Construction has been successfully completed and the new building began serving students in March 2017.

The Certificate of Substantial Completion is significant in that the Architect and Construction Manager-at-Risk (CMR) certify the constructed facility is materially complete except for punch list corrections that need to be completed. Substantial completion allows the CMR to reduce the site staffing levels and transfer responsibility for insuring the structure to the Owner. Acceptance by the Owner at the earliest date possible reduces construction costs.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

ADMINISTRATION RECOMMENDATION/REPORT

The administration recommends the Board of Trustees approve the purchase of audio visual equipment, cabling supplies and services from Network Cabling Services (NCS).

BACKGROUND

As part of planned and budgeted technology equipment replacements and data cabling for the current fiscal year, primarily the audio/video (AV) products which includes the design of turn-key AV solutions, expansion and additions to existing systems and ongoing maintenance and support throughout the lifecycle of the AV system, the ITS department needs a firm that can provide audio visual products and services for classroom, conference, and instructional spaces. The items and services procured include cable drops, supplies, equipment, repair and maintenance related to installations and replacements for classrooms and conference spaces at all three campuses.

Network Cabling Services has contracts through multiple cooperative program enabling them to offer AV and cabling supplies and services, Contract Numbers TCPN R5168 and Buy Board 482-15. Use of these cooperative contracts comply with the competitive procurement requirement in Section 44.031 of the Texas Education Code and is permitted through Section 791.001(g) of the Texas Government Code.

IMPACT OF THIS ACTION

Network Cabling Services offers products and components that are used to maintain and replace the presentation and audio visual system equipment in classroom and conference rooms college-wide, as well as the network cabling drops required college-wide.

BUDGET INFORMATION (INCLUDING ANY STAFFING IMPLICATIONS)

In August and October 2016, the Board approved a total expenditure of \$300,000 for the purchase of audio visual and cabling equipment and services. This request would increase the total amount approved by \$140,000 for a total of \$440,000 to address all anticipated projects through the remainder of the fiscal year. This expenditure will be funded from the 2016-2017 operating budgets of various departments.

V.	Update on Campus Carry Task Force Progress & Policy/Procedure Review	Chet Lewis gave an overview of the process since the Board last reviewed this item. He reviewed the changes on the track changes version of the Campus Carry Policy and Procedures document. These changes incorporate the items that the Board of Trustees asked to be addressed when the draft policy and procedures was reviewed with the Board at the March 6, 2017 Board workshop. He noted that all items are in the policy and there are no procedures currently developed.	

This draft policy was distributed to all College employees on March 22, 2017, for comments. We received feedback from less than 10 employees. This feedback included many comments and suggestions which were discussed with the Campus Carry Taskforce last week. The majority of these comments and suggestions were related to clarifications which will greatly assist in the development of clear communications and training regarding the implementation of this policy. Some of the other comments and suggestions resulted in changes to the Campus Carry Policy.

The Campus Carry Taskforce researched the current practices and discovered that language existed in some university policies that allows for an application process for gun exclusion zones in private, sole occupant offices. However, in practice, the Taskforce learned that applications for private office gun exclusion zones were not being approved solely based on an office occupant's discretionary request. Therefore, the Taskforce recommended to remove this section from the policy if the application of that policy section was to generally deny requests that didn't identify another section of the policy to justify the gun exclusion zone request.

The Taskforce members in attendance at the meeting voted 100% in support of these changes. While the original intent was to take the policy for first reading on April 10, 2017, to the Board of Trustees, it was decided to postpone this reading in order to provide an opportunity for additional feedback from the College community.

Brenda Hellyer stated that she met with the Faculty Organization officers on Friday, and they were comfortable with the changes.

Keith Sinor noted that number 3 in the policy, needs to be reviewed. There is an extra word in the sentence.

Chet explained that the next steps are to send an updated version out to the College community again for feedback for employees to have an opportunity to comment on the changes. The first reading will be presented to the Board on May 1, 2017. The second reading is anticipated for June 5, 2017.

VI. Review Chancellor's Job Description

Brenda Hellyer gave an overview of the updated Chancellor job description. For SACSCOC compliance, a review of the job description with the Board is required. No action is needed.
