

THRIVING WITH TUITION-FREE EDUCATION: HUYNH TRIUMPHS, GROWS AS PROMISE SCHOLAR

The Promise @ San Jac Scholarship has been changing students' lives through debtfree education since 2021.

One of those students, Lara Huynh, recently completed her first year at San Jacinto College as a Promise Scholar and is grateful for the opportunity.

"When my parents and I first heard about Promise, we thought it might be too good to be true," she said. "After we learned more, it was like we struck gold. My parents were so excited that my tuition would be free."

During the Promise pledge process, even though Huynh felt a bit overwhelmed, San Jac staff like former Promise coordinator Roberto Mendez were there to help.

"There were a lot of steps to enroll in Promise, but I thought, 'This is free college — do what you need to do,'" Huynh said. "Mr. Mendez was a huge help anytime I'd run into a problem with paperwork. I couldn't imagine missing out on this opportunity because I gave up."

A natural science major, Huynh found the transition from high school to college a bit rocky, forcing her to develop new study habits.

"I didn't have to study much in high school," Huynh said. "I got by without it. College has shown me that I can't do that anymore. I learned that the hard way, especially with anatomy and physiology."

After Huynh's first semester, she developed her own path to success.

"In college, each day is a different chapter. It's fast-paced," she said. "I have to make sure I'm asking questions as soon as I have them. Also, finding a study group is key."

Huynh has also found getting involved in the San Jac community significant to her time in college.

"There are so many student clubs and not just for academics," she said.
"There is a K-pop club and a self-defense club. If you have an interest, you can find other students who are into the same things. Finding those people has helped boost my confidence and helped me to make new friends."

In the future, Huynh hopes to pursue a bachelor's degree and a career in the medical field.

"I'm grateful for the opportunities the Promise program has afforded me," she said.

Like many high school seniors, Gary Cooper cringed at that question. He had just moved to Texas, and each day held enough challenges.

Cooper wasn't even considering college until San Jacinto College representatives shared about a debt-free degree with his senior class. The Promise @ San Jac Scholarship not only sparked his interest but gave him a path.

"Two years ago, I had no idea what I wanted to do in life or how I was going to pursue a career," said Cooper, who graduates this May with an associate degree in fine arts. "Now I have a full plan to succeed and am on pace to achieve all my goals."

San Jac changes impossible to "I'm possible" every day for students. April is Community College Month, celebrating high-quality education within reach. With endless options and personal support, San Jac can put you — like Cooper — on the path to success.

Transfer pathways

San Jac offers more than 200 degrees and certificates. Some paths lead to a solid career, while others transfer to a four-year institution for a higher degree.

Your assigned program advisor will answer questions about different majors, classes, careers, and university transfer options — and keep you in the loop about deadlines, scholarships, and internships.

"Your advisor can also help you learn about universities with strong programs in your major or unique experiences like study abroad or summer camps," Crystal Ramirez Moreno, transfer pathway coordinator, said. "Your advisor is a great advocate to have on your side!"

Not sure which major to choose? That's normal with hundreds of possible careers and transfer universities.

"Remember, your decision isn't

permanent," Moreno said. "You can change later if you need to."

If a bachelor's degree is your goal, your advisor will help make the transfer process as smooth as possible. Moreno recommends attending transfer fairs and touring universities as early as your first semester, when classes are less challenging.

Student success

Beyond having his tuition and textbooks covered 100% through the Promise @ San Jac Scholarship, Cooper has "benefited a lot from making the decision to attend San Jac."

"Even if you're unsure which career path you want to pursue, San Jac provides a lot of resources that will help you make a smart decision," he said. "Career and academic advisors and professors give a lot of advice and realworld experience that will help you progress." After graduating this spring, Cooper will study graphic design at the University of Houston-Clear Lake. One day he hopes to design promo materials for an NBA team or music artists.

Also graduating this spring is computer science major Dior Muankaew, a future software engineer/data scientist.

Like Cooper, Muankaew has leveraged San Jac's support network to prepare for transfer. She recommends getting help from the College's academic advisors, mental health counselors, and tutoring center.

Finishing high school at 16, Muankaew found San Jac to be the perfect launchpad.

"I felt like attending a four-year university wasn't feasible for me at that age," she said. "I would have accrued a lot of debt, and I wasn't mature enough to be on my own just yet. So I enrolled at San Jacinto College for the affordability, time to mature, and an introduction to higher education."

FROM FIRE TORNADOES TO FOAM GNOMES, YOUTH EXPERIENCE MIND-BLOWING SCIENCE

Local youth experienced mindblowing science during San Jacinto College's Mind Trekkers STEM Festival March 7-8.

Held at the Central Campus'
LyondellBasell Center for
Petrochemical, Energy, & Technology,
the annual STEM outreach event
during the daytime drew approximately
5,300 sixth graders from Pasadena,
Deer Park, La Porte, Channelview,
Galena Park, Sheldon, and Clear
Creek ISDs — as well as First Baptist
Christian Academy and The Rhodes
School for the Performing Arts.
Hundreds of community families
attended the free family night on
March 7.

Science left college labs, transforming into 100 hands-on demos and activities run by San Jac faculty, staff, and students and community volunteers. From liquid nitrogen ice cream and a fire tornado to burning money and a moment of inertia spinner, experiments engaged the mind — and all five senses.

"Since 2015, this has been one of San Jac's largest STEM outreach initiatives specifically for sixth graders in our local area and those in greater Houston," said Dr. Allatia Harris, vice chancellor of strategic initiatives. "Our Mind Trekkers Family Night is also a great chance for community members to bring their families out to this unique STEM experience."

ART AND INSPIRATION: Q&A WITH PROFESSOR NAOMI LEMUS

San Jacinto College North Campus professor and program alumna Naomi Lemus is a talented artist and educator. She shares about her journey, which has embodied resilience, determination, and a passion for reminded me there is no right both art and education:

Q: Tell me about yourself.

A: I was born and raised in Galena Park. My mom still lives five minutes from the North Campus. Growing up as a firstgeneration Mexican American forced me to weave through multicultural environments and spaces, and that reflects who I am today.

Q: What is your San Jac story?

A: I came to San Jac because I didn't know where else to go or my college options. I am a first-generation college student, and all of this was new to me. I started with core classes and instantly became overwhelmed. My mom encouraged me to lessen my course load and look at things I enjoyed doing. That's when I enrolled in painting and drawing classes with Joe Clark, a wonderful mentor. I didn't even know then that being an art major was an option.

Q: What was life like after San Jac?

A: I enrolled at the University of Houston and earned my bachelor's degree in painting. And then I thought, "What

I applied to several graduate schools and was denied to all but one. Temple University in Philadelphia put me on the waitlist. I didn't know if I would get in, but I remained hopeful.

In May, I got a call that a spot opened. I didn't even think before saving ves.

It was the first time I left home and spread my wings. While at Temple, I learned to stand in my voice. I thought I didn't have the "right words" to talk about art, but my professors way to perceive art, and I had something to offer.

I've been fortunate with the professors at San Iac, the University of Houston, and Temple — people who have mentored and guided me through my journey gracefully.

Q: Why did you become an educator?

A: A few months before my graduate program's end, I sent Joe Clark a message and said, "Hey, I'm ready to come back." Luckily, there was an opening, and in August 2022 I became a full-time faculty member.

I didn't necessarily pursue art education, but it found me. I wanted to give back like many mentors had done for me. This career is perfect for where I am right now. I offer my students a unique point of view because it wasn't long ago that I was in their shoes, feeling self-doubt and questioning if I was good enough to belong. I need to encourage and validate my students' experiences as much as their artistic ability.

Q: Talk about your artistic journey and what inspires you.

A: My work looks to comprehend generational narratives of trauma through the lens of empathy, acknowledgment, mending, and forward movement.

My search for emotional healing is a personal and artistic practice that focuses on forms of movement. Chicano curator assemblage installation. These installations pull from family archives, such as handwritten letters, family photos, and personal and borrowed memories. I work alongside family members to recreate memories that have shaped us and our perspective of loved ones.

These works draw from the "rasquachismo" art

and author Amalia Mesa-Bains explains that "in its broadest sense, 'rasquachismo' is a combination of resistant and resilient attitudes devised to allow the Chicano to survive and persevere with a sense of dignity." "Domesticana" is a form of feminist "rasquachismo" - to undo the wounds of patriarchy and colonization.

Q: Additional thoughts?

A: I am consciously grateful every day for my experiences. I am lucky to be a full-time professor at my age, and I don't take that for granted. I've left myself open to opportunities, and that's been rewarding. I hope to instill that into my students as well.
