San Jac launches space experiment competition

San Jacinto College — in collaboration with the National Center for Earth and Space Science Education — is offering an opportunity for students to partake in scientific exploration beyond the Earth's atmosphere.

Current College students and area high school students are ready to unleash their scientific creativity by designing microgravity experiments to be conducted in Pasadena and aboard the International Space Station simultaneously. This unprecedented initiative was unveiled in late September during the grand opening of the South Campus STEM Center, marking a new era of collaboration between education and space exploration.

Students will form teams of three to five and find a faculty advisor and industry advisor. Then, the teams will collaborate to conceive, design, and develop their groundbreaking experiments, exploring how different physical and chemical processes behave in the absence of Earth's gravity.

The winning experiment will be selected in December and sent to the International Space Station in September 2024.

of the National Center for Earth and
Space Science Education in the U.S.
and the Arthur C. Clarke Institute
for Space Education internationally.
It is enabled through a strategic
partnership with NanoRacks LLC,
which works with NASA under a Space
Act Agreement using the International
Space Station as a national laboratory.

"I had been thinking about working two jobs to make it through college," Vo said. "Instead, Promise allowed me to work part time and focus more on school."



DOUBLE TAKE: ZAVALA BROTHERS SHARE COLLEGE, CAREER GOALS

It's like "The Parent Trap" when San Jacinto College student ambassadors Marcos and Francisco Zavala help new students with orientation, campus tours, and course selection.

Cue the double take.

"Half the time, when a student walks into our lab, we say the exact same thing at the same time," Marcos said. "And half the time when the student leaves, they think I'm my brother, and my brother is me."

"It's like a comedy honestly," Francisco added.

Looking and sounding alike aren't the only things the brothers share — despite being 11 months apart.

They're also earning associate degrees in business administration debt-free through the Promise @ San Jac Scholarship. Available to all in-district high school seniors, the scholarship covers a San Jac degree or certificate 100% after other financial aid.

The former home-schooled students learned about Promise @ San Jac through a cousin. Both thought it sounded "too good to be true" but decided to apply while finishing high school in spring 2022.

Not only was the scholarship real, but they were also both eligible.

"We don't have to worry about ever having to pay for a class here at San Jac," Marcos said. "That's taken a huge load off ourselves and our family as well."

Although they had always wanted to attend college, the scholarship removed the guesswork from deciding when and where to start

"It's helped me by allowing me to focus on my studies instead of working or taking a gap year so I could afford to go to college," Francisco said.

CENTRAL CAMPUS GALLERY OPENS IN NEW LOCATION

The San Jacinto College Central Campus Gallery has a new address after a monthslong relocation to the Lee Davis Library.

"The new location gives us much more foot traffic and opportunities to collaborate with the library," said Carmen Champion, gallery coordinator. "It features a main gallery and a smaller 'black box gallery' along with a custom-built reception desk to greet visitors."

The 1,300-square-foot space is also equipped to store 2D and 3D works with a designated workbench and table to create labels and frames for the featured exhibitions.

"The robust industrial look and design offer an enhanced environment for students to learn about various types of art, to expand their knowledge of art through touring exhibitions, and participate in student exhibits as they progress through the College's art programs," said David Sample, facilities operations manager. "Hats off to the design and construction teams who helped deliver the product we envisioned."

The gallery's inaugural exhibit, "Miguel Covarrubias: Caricaturista," coincided with the College's celebration of Hispanic Heritage Month.

Produced in partnership with the Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center at the University of Texas at Austin and Humanities Texas, the state affiliate of the National Endowment for the Humanities, the exhibition features the work of one of the foremost Mexican artists of the 20th century.

"Miguel Covarrubias: Caricaturista" focuses on the sophisticated caricatures that made Covarrubias famous. His caricatures provide a unique window into the cultural and political milieu of the 1920s and '30s. A quintessential humanist, he made essential contributions to anthropology, archaeology, theater, and dance.

In the spring, Champion will host a public grand opening



VETERAN PIVOTS FROM MILITARY ENCRYPTING TO COMPUTER NETWORKING

At 17, Keisha Parkes signed an Army contract so her single mom would never worry about her having money or food. At 41, she enrolled at San Jacinto College with a different mission.

"I want to show my 21-year-old daughter it's never too late to go after your dreams," she said.

Parkes, who is pursuing a computer science associate degree, has always enjoyed working with computers and troubleshooting. During her 15 years in the Army, she served as a signal support system specialist, encrypting communications for satellite, antennas, and radio.

"Troubleshooting is second nature to me," she said. "If I don't know how to do it, I'll find a way to do it."

After graduating from San Jac next year, the veteran plans to complete her bachelor's degree at Texas Southern University. Then she may work in the private sector as a network architect or administrator. Thanks to her military experience, cybersecurity could also be an option.

Parkes loves computers, but she didn't love the fears she faced returning to the classroom after two decades. Questions tumbled in her mind: "So much

has changed since I graduated. How am I going to do this? Will I be good enough?"

"Keisha," her mom countered, "you're smart. You can do this."

Just as her biggest cheerleader predicted, Parkes could handle it. She has taken online classes at Generation Park, San Jac's newest campus, and picked up classes at other campuses. She has even received an invitation to join the Phi Theta Kappa honor society.

As a full-time student, she applies military discipline to her studies.

"I haven't had a final grade lower than 89," she said. "I try to schedule my classes early in the day to give myself the evening to pace out my homework. I like a four-day schedule for school, with Friday to relax — I do absolutely nothing school-related. After that, I finish whatever I have to do."

Although the Army operates on perfection, Parkes has learned to give herself grace with assignments and course material.

"Sometimes you're not going to understand something the first go-around," she said. "It's OK to ask for help. Take it one day at a time."

Recently, she felt honored to be named Generation Park's recipient of the San Jacinto College Veteran Student Success Scholarship.

"It's OK when you think you're doing good," she said. "It's even better when someone you've never met before thinks that."

To celebrate Veterans Day, the San Jacinto College Foundation presented the scholarship to seven students Nov. 3. Whether Veterans Day or any other military celebration, Parkes welcomes the appreciation. When her service ended in 2015, she had deployed multiple times to Iraq and ranked as a sergeant in the reserves.

"When we sign our military contracts, we're often young kids," she said. "We sign for different reasons. No one really knows after signing what that means or entails. We go through a lot in our process of military service."

Many know what should be done to protect freedoms, but few do the work. According to Parkes, every day

- Veterans Day or not - is an excellent opportunity to thank a veteran in your circle and your community.

"I haven't seen any celebration that is pointless," she said. "Being seen and

recognized means a lot."

"Now I'm saving up more money in the long run for a university and focusing on making better grades for future scholarships."

While debt-free college was a big perk, both have found San Jac a second home because of the people.

"I've made friends who have the same goals and aspirations as I do, and they motivate me to do better in and out of school," Francisco said.

"Everybody — from the faculty to the school administration — is extremely helpful and genuinely wants to see us succeed," Marcos added.

As student ambassadors, the brothers even help newer Promise Scholars navigate college too, reminding them of deadlines and credit requirements. After San Jac, they will transfer to the University of Houston-Clear Lake to pursue bachelor's degrees in finance.

"Figuring out transferring here has been a breeze," Marcos said. "I have my whole two-year degree mapped out and my two-year degree at UHCL mapped out as well."

While Marcos may work in a medical or oil field business office or become

a personal financial advisor, Francisco is eyeing the government sector. After getting workforce experience, they hope to open a gym together someday.

For now, though, they're laser-focused

on finishing their studies at San Jac. What's it like working and attending college together?

"It's fun," Marcos said. "We save gas for sure."
